

PASTOR'S PAGES . . .

Remember that you are dust, and to dust you shall return. These 40 days of Lent are a time for us to remember our fragile humanity. We will quickly journey through this season of Lent to the Great 3 days of Jesus' death and resurrection. While on our journey, I recommend finding a daily faith discipline that will help you turn to the LORD. We have included links to a few free online devotionals in this newsletter that have helped some members really grow in their faith (page 8). We also have free printed daily devotionals available at the church. I recommend taking the time to read a devotion and pray each day. Spend some quality time with God. If you want to listen to the bible daily with a commentary and prayer, I recommend the website www.dabplayer.com. You can listen to the bible



chronologically or listen to readings from both the Old and New Testament every day. Either way, you will hear the bible in one year. If you find it hard to make a time commitment each day to listen for about 25 minutes, you can listen to a Proverb or a Psalm each day on the same website. There are many options for listening, including one for children. Daily Audio Bible also has a prayer wall for people to call in with their prayer concerns. It is very moving to listen to and reminds us of our human frailty and need for God and for community. Martin Luther is known for saying, "I am so busy now that if I did not spend three hours each day in prayer, I could not get through the day."

Our Lenten midweek services are at 5:30 p.m. on Wednesdays, and we will be working our way through Luther's Small Catechism. If you did not grow up in the Lutheran Church, you may learn a lot from this series. I am sad that we will not have the traditional Lenten soup suppers and fellowship following our service. I am very hopeful that this tradition will return next year, but in order to remain safe, we will not be serving food or joining in any fellowship events until it is safe again. Please do not use that as an excuse to skip out on these wonderful worship services. Here are some things you might learn when you attend. What are the 10 Commandments and why do they matter? Why do we confess the Apostles or Nicene Creed each Sunday? When we pray the Lord's prayer, are we really only forgiven as we forgive others? Do you understand why Lutherans baptize infants and what we believe about baptism? How often should we receive the Sacrament of Holy Communion, and what difference does it make? Please make an effort to attend in person or online. We will continue to broadcast each midweek service online just like our Sunday Worship.

Because I know that our April newsletter will not come to your homes before Easter, I also want to let you know that this year, we will have 3 opportunities for in person worship on Easter. We will have a 7 a.m. sunrise service outdoors (weather permitting). We will have public worship indoors at 8:30 a.m. (Facemasks will be required. Physical distancing will also be required.) We will also broadcast our 8:30

a.m. service online and have it available on the internet after worship is completed. We will have a second outdoor worship at 10:30 a.m. (weather permitting). We will have folding chairs, but please feel free to bring your own comfortable lawn chairs for the outdoor services.

This Lenten journey will go quickly! Think about the many ways you can, "return to the Lord your God." this Lenten season. Easter is just a short time away. Resurrection Sunday will be even more meaningful if you have spiritually disciplined yourself in some way. Devote more time to God. Our time on earth is limited. Make the most out of it. Pray, listen, and pay attention to God's plan for your life.

2021 LENTEN SCHEDULE...



In Lent, 2021, the central theme of Lenten Wednesdays will be based on the small catechism. Wednesday evening prayer and reflection is rooted in the order for Evening Prayer. Each week provides readings from sacred Scripture as the center point for reflection. These readings explore different dimensions of God's love for us and the love of Christ we share. The schedule is as follows:

Ash Wednesday, February 17 - Worship with Holy Communion and imposition of ashes

- First Week of Lent, February 24 "The Ten Commandments" (Exodus 34: 1-9, 27-28) In Exodus God gives Moses the Law so that the people of Israel would know how to fulfill their part of God's covenant as God's people.
- <u>Second Week of Lent</u>, March 3 "The Apostles' Creed" (Ezekiel 36:22-32) How do we express belief? How do we share our faith? The Creed, crafted in the early days of the church, gives us a simple but firm foundation for sharing and professing.
- Third Week of Lent, March 10 "The Lord's Prayer" (Matthew 6: 9-15) Lent and Lenten worship call us to repent, to make a new beginning. One of the best ways to begin again with God is through conversation, also known as prayer. And what better prayer than the one that Jesus taught us?
- <u>Fourth Week of Lent</u>, March 17 "Baptism" (Romans 6: 1-14) Dying to our old, sinful self in baptism, we rise from the waters as beloved children of God. We are walking wet throughout the forty days of Lent, reminded daily that we are dead to sin.
- <u>Fifth Week of Lent</u>, March 24 "Communion" (Matthew 26: 26-29) As we approach Holy Week, we remember Jesus' sacrifice for us. We gather around the table to remind ourselves and one another of that sacrifice and how it shapes our lives.
- Holy Week, Evening celebration of Maundy Thursday, April 1 and Good Friday, April 2.
- <u>Easter</u>, April 4 Festive Easter services will be at 7:00 a.m. outside in the courtyard (weather permitting), 8:30 a.m. in the Sanctuary, and 10:30 a.m. outside in the courtyard (weather permitting).

COUNCIL'S CORNER...

January 12, 2021

The meeting was called to order at 6:06 p.m. by Pastor Jeff Ungs.

The meeting of the Shepherd of the Glades Council was held via conference call because of the Corona Virus. Members in attendance: Bonny Dery, Pat Cooper, Bonnie Brisky, Paul Hashagen, Barb Keller, Phil Willman, Bob Tidmore, Charlotte Wahlig, Brenda Charleston, Penny Morken, and Doug Walck. Pastor Ungs was also in attendance. Devotions were given by Pastor Ungs.

A motion to approve the minutes of the last Council meeting as written was made, seconded, and passed.

Pastor's report: Pastor Jeff reported that he has had "Zoom" meetings with Caloosa Conference, East Naples Ministerial group, personal spiritual direction meetings; meetings with Altar Guild members, ushers, Worship Committee, and the nominating committee. He has also had AV training for the new equipment and weekly staff meetings. Pastor has been calling, visiting, and praying with members that have been hospitalized or sick or interested in joining the church. He has had two funerals this month. He has been doing homebound communions. Pastor is sending weekly readings in advance of the Worship service, and videotaping weekly greeters for Sunday worship. Due to weather conditions, both Worship services on Christmas Eve were held indoors. In-person attendance was sparse but online views more than made up for the decrease in personal attendance. He is having discussions with the Worship committee regarding Ash Wednesday and mid-week services during Lent. Due to the Coronavirus, there is no way to safely distribute ashes and it is likely the service will be different this year.

Treasurer's Report: Bob Tidmore reported that the giving exceeded the expenses, He also updated Council on account balances and the PPP loan. Doug Walck made a motion to approve the Treasurer's report, which was seconded Phil Willman and approved by all.

Committee reports:

<u>Endowment</u> – Bob Tidmore reported that the balance in the Endowment account is \$140,987 as of December 31, 2020. The Council made a motion and approved the distribution of \$15,000 from the Endowment Fund and \$10,000 from the Memorial Fund per the recommendation of the Endowment committee. This will be for \$5,000 for higher education seminary student grant, \$10,000 matching funds to capital improvements, and \$10,000 from Memorial Fund to be used for matching funds for capital improvements in 2021.

Parish Relations - Barb Keller is now the liaison to the Mutual Ministry Team.

<u>Property</u> - Doug Walck had submitted a written report. He contacted electrical contractor about status of the parking lot lights. Lights should be in next week. The well has been repaired for the cost of \$3,000. A new sound amplifier has been ordered for \$1,000. Santa Barbara sign will be ready this week. Will paint the front sign in the near future.

Stewardship - Pete is trying to recruit three people for the stewardship talks in January.

This Council meeting was led by Pastor Ungs and the purpose of the meeting was for Council to get better acquainted. Council members participated in the exercises, and everyone got to know each other better. Council members elected the 2021 Executive Officers and they are as follows:

A CAPITAL IDEA . . .

Property Capital Campaign Update

In February, Doug Walck gave a temple talk on stewarding our property. He shared that we would be doing a capital campaign in 2021 to make much needed improvements to the property. The new sign on Santa Barbara is completed, and the new lights for the parking lot are currently being replaced. The largest item in need of improvements is the parking lot. The overall financial capital needed to complete all of these projects in 2021 will be somewhere between \$60,000 to \$100,000, depending on how the parking lot improvement is done. We are still receiving bids for this project but would like to see it completed in the late Summer of 2021. The Council has approved and currently has matching funds of \$25,000 pledged to this designated fund and the goal is to have half of the money needed to complete the work pledged as matching funds before the parking lot work begins. All funds you designate to the capital campaign fund will be matched. Please note that regular giving and what you have pledged to the general offering is not included in this campaign. Regular offerings are needed to maintain the day to day ministry expenses we share. More information will be coming during announcements and as final bids are received for the parking lot. The property committee has asked, and Don Bassett has agreed to assist with the fundraising element of this project. Thank you Don!

FOOD FOR THE SOUL . . .

John 3:14–21 "¹⁴ And just as Moses lifted up the serpent in the wilderness, so must the Son of Man be lifted up, ¹⁵ that whoever believes in him may have eternal life. ¹⁶ "For God so loved the world that he gave his only Son, so that everyone who believes in him may not perish but may have eternal life. ¹⁷ "Indeed, God did not send the Son into the world to condemn the world, but in order that the world might be saved through him. ¹⁸ Those who believe in him are not condemned; but those who do not believe are condemned already, because they have not believed in the name of the only Son of God. ¹⁹ And this is the judgment, that the light has come into the world, and people loved darkness rather than light because their deeds were evil. ²⁰ For all who do evil hate the light and do not come to the light, so that their deeds may not be exposed. ²¹ But those who do what is true come to the light, so that it may be clearly seen that their deeds have been done in God."

Many of us have had painful experiences of what we thought was "love" in various types of relationships. Superficial affection, self-interest, and even abuse can masquerade as love and make us doubt if such a thing even exists. This familiar gospel reading shows that real love is God's love, defined as a gift (see verse 16). Not just any gift, but the gift of God's only Son, Jesus, who willingly died humanity's death so that all can live an abundant life both now and forever. Love is manifest not only in the gift itself, but also in God's act of giving sacrificially for the benefit of others. Divine love calls and capacitates people to give of themselves to God and others for the sake of true relationships that build up, not destroy. As we journey toward the cross, we are called to surrender false notions of love and our very selves to the One who is true love.

Loving God, forgive us for the ways we have hurt or failed to love others. Pour your love into our lives to heal our wounds and free us to truly love you, ourselves, and the world for which you died.
